

What is the purpose of the tool kit?



The Tool Kit is a Wisconsin-specific guide to braiding equity into climate policies, plans, and programs at the local level. It is intended for municipal staff, policy makers, and advocates.

- Ensure equity is a focal point of local climate planning regardless of size, demographics, geography or resources.
- Support communities at all stages of climate readiness.
- Create a Community of Practice for Wisconsin municipalities around equitable climate planning.
- Prepare for funding opportunities (IIJA/IRA).
- Create a living tool that will continue to feature the good work of Wisconsin's communities.


How did we approach equity in the tool kit?

- Prioritize historically marginalized and frontline communities: maximize benefits and minimize further harms.
- Use a broad lens: processes & participation, distribution of benefits, and historical & structural barriers.
- Address intersectionality: marginalized communities often experience climate impacts in multiple ways that are compounded.
- Connect lived experiences with policy.

A growing number of local governments in Wisconsin are adopting plans and policies to address climate change. Members of the Wisconsin Climate Table developed this Tool Kit to provide a resource for municipalities to center equity in their climate plans and policies, regardless of their size, budget, geography, or demographics. It is meant to ensure that historically marginalized communities will benefit first from climate policies and programs.

Municipal staff, policymakers, and local elected officials can use the strategies and resources in the Tool Kit to prioritize equity and prepare for potential funding opportunities that require adherence to environmental justice principles such as Justice 40.

The Tool Kit has four main components, which can be accessed through the links below. The Strategy Guide is the heart of the Tool Kit, and rather than a step-by-step guide or checklist, it offers a menu of options to choose from based on the unique characteristics of a community. Annotated lists of municipal examples from around Wisconsin and the United States offer a curated list of best practices that can serve as models for communities looking to form or update their own climate policies and plans. Finally, a comprehensive list of resources such as guides and data tools are available in a fourth module. Planners and policymakers are invited to explore the Tool Kit from any starting point they choose.

The Tool Kit was developed through a collaborative process with members of the Wisconsin Climate Table's Community Commitments Campaign through volunteer and pro bono support, research and review of best practices to underpin proposed strategies and national examples, and input from municipal staff and community leaders. As such, we see the Tool Kit as a living document, and invite planners and policymakers to offer suggestions and share the work from their communities using the contact form.

The Plan is strong on outreach and engagement and is notably inclusive of community members, though it does not specify who was involved in the planning process. The Plan lacks specific details for strategies and tactics related to implementation, does not include costs or

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
Strategy Guide

The Strategy Guide is not a scorecard, but rather a menu of strategies that municipalities can consider based on their unique circumstances and characteristics, including staff and budgetary resources, environmental conditions, population, and community resources and priorities.

The Guide can be consulted at any phase of the process, from drafting a resolution, to crafting a plan, through implementation and evaluation, so that future follow-on steps are clear. It should be shared among staff across municipal departments and with elected officials/policy-makers to support collaborative efforts and make sure priorities are aligned.

The Strategy Guide includes the following components: Community Engagement, Mitigation Strategies to Reduce Greenhouse Gas Emissions, Resiliency Strategies, Workforce, Equitable Access to Resources, Metrics and Evaluation, and Governance.

Each component of the strategy guide is essential to meeting the Toolkit's goal of providing Wisconsin communities a resource for incorporating equity considerations in regard to climate action planning.

Mitigation Strategies to Reduce Greenhouse Gas Emissions

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Transportation: Access to Reliable and Safe Transportation

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Objective: Historically, communities of color and people living in low-income neighborhoods are less likely to own a vehicle. These communities and people living in rural areas are less likely to have access to convenient public transit and safe bicycle and pedestrian networks and are more vulnerable to pedestrian crashes. Additionally, many police departments lack comprehensive methods for accurately recording and reporting pedestrian and bicycle crash data.

Do your transportation networks prioritize safe, easy, and convenient access to public transit and multi-modal transportation networks for everyone in your locality, particularly those without access to a vehicle? Do low and moderate income neighborhoods have access to active transportation networks for walking and biking?

Examples of Data Needed for Equitable Strategy Development (Qualitative and Quantitative)

- Do you know where people live who are most likely to lack access to a reliable vehicle?
- Do you have complete GIS data showing sidewalk and pedestrian networks?
- Do you have complete GIS data showing designated bicycle routes, including multi-use trails and marked bike lanes?
- Do you have complete information on police reports of bicycle and pedestrian crashes?
- Are you using crash data to prioritize street and intersection redesign?
- Are you designing transit and micro transit routes using data showing where the most vulnerable populations (rural and urban) in your community need to go?

Examples of Equity-Based Municipal Strategies

Public Transit:

- Employ progressive pricing for public transit
- Prioritize transit routes serving low-income communities
- Plan for transit routes connecting housing with economic/ job centers
- Provide micro transit options (e.g., on-demand shuttles) for low-income rural communities

Active Transportation:

- Provide/expand access for active transportation and micro-mobility options such as biking share/bike trails, scooters, etc.
- Re-connect communities impacted/bisected by past highway projects
- Implement a Complete Streets policy to prioritize transportation modes for people outside of vehicles

Safety.

- Prioritize pedestrian safety improvements in low-income communities
- Ensure community-based climate resiliency plans and evacuation strategies include public

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Opportunities

- New funding from federal government under IRA for EV charging
- Review DOT and County road expansion wish lists; encourage scoring systems that channel funding toward fix-it-first, transit expansion, transit electrification
- Support MPOs
- Advocate for community control of charging infrastructure

Obstacles

- PSC regulations
- State DOT has authority to continue investing funds in highway expansion, with its continued adverse effects on emissions goals and air quality impacts on low-income and BIPOC communities
- Communities in WI are precluded from establishing regional transportation agencies (RTAs) by the legislature
- Currently, the only funding allocated by WisDOT for bike/ped infrastructure comes from federal TAP (Transportation Alternatives Program), which is competitive.
- Wisconsin removed Complete Streets language from the administrative code in 2015. There are no state standards for Complete Streets.


