### **Academy Talks: Growing Our Creative Power**

A thriving creative culture is central to Wisconsin's economic growth, from fueling knowledge-based economic development, to sparking innovation and entrepreneurship. It's also key to creating vibrant places where people want to live, work, and raise families. We teamed up with the Wisconsin Arts Board, Arts Wisconsin, and the League of Wisconsin Municipalities to tap their knowledge on how investments in a range of creative endeavors are strengthening Wisconsin. Through six compelling free public talks at Overture Center for the Arts, we learned:

Investments yield big benefits: Access to the arts in our communities builds a sense of place, retains residents, and attracts talent. Investments in liberal arts education yield graduates who bring communication skills, ethics, empathy, and the ability to solve problems across disciplines to their work and lives. These leadership skills help build a healthy democracy.

Nurturing creativity in our kids grows the capacity for risk-taking and open-ended problem-solving and fearless autonomy. Entrepreneurs thrive in work cultures that embrace diversity, inclusivity, trust and social interactions, but they also need help with the basics such as legal advice, access to capital and technology, and affordable health insurance.

In science, one of the most critical creative acts is not problem solving but problem selection. Higher education would do well to teach "how to discover" along with "what you must know."

So yes, there are many ways we can grow Wisconsin's creative power, and our speakers and audiences are already showing us the way.



### James Watrous Gallery: Telling our story with art

The James Watrous Gallery continues to support Wisconsin artists and create exhibitions that tell important stories about our state and its culture. In fall 2016, we showcased the raised beadwork of the Wisconsin Oneida. Developed in partnership with the Oneida Nation Arts program and Oneida Nation Museum, the *Beading Culture* exhibition told a story of creativity as an act of survival, connection across geography and generations, and layered meaning through each beautifully crafted piece. The sixteen participating artists were generous with their stories and skills as well with as their work. The extensive programming for this show included a hands-on beading workshop, an artists' panel, and gallery talks by folklorist and co-curator Anne Pryor, art historian Melanie Herzog, and Watrous director Jody Clowes. We also produced a nine-minute video—our first!—to screen in the gallery during the exhibition.

From the artists' close involvement with the exhibition co-curators to the contributions of videographer Tom Moss and scholars from across Wisconsin, *Beading Culture* was a profoundly collaborative project. We received financial support for *Beading Culture* from the National Endowment for the Arts (a first for the Academy), Wisconsin Humanities Council, Dane Arts, and Madison Arts Commission, as well as several generous private donors. *Beading Culture* also traveled to the Oneida Nation Museum in Oneida, Wisconsin, where it will be on view through September 2018.

In winter 2017, we joined the celebration of Wisconsin Public Radio's one hundredth anniversary with the Let's Draw exhibition. Featuring a diverse selection of drawings by six Wisconsin artists, the exhibition also shared student works, recordings, and ephemera from WPR's original "Let's Draw" radio program, which provided art lessons for thousands of Wisconsin schoolchildren from 1936 to 1970. With the help of WPR's Erika Janik, four of the featured contemporary artists also wrote and recorded their own audio art lessons, which were presented in the gallery during the exhibition and remain available online. The opening reception featured a live recreation of a 1936 "Let's Draw" broadcast, and our staff offered several tours and gallery talks in addition to two drawing workshops. Let's Draw would not have been possible without the generous assistance of staff from Wisconsin Public Radio, the Museum of Wisconsin Art, and the UW–Madison Archives.

### Wisconsin Academy Initiatives

The Academy's Wisconsin Initiatives bring Wisconsin residents together with a diverse array of experts and stakeholders to find solutions to statewide problems. Formerly known as the Wisconsin Idea at the Wisconsin Academy, our Initiatives program addresses the unique challenges we face as Wisconsinites and citizens of the world.

#### Waters of Wisconsin Initiative


In September 2016, we published *Shifting Currents*, the culmination of a four-year renewal of the Academy's Waters of Wisconsin project that takes the long-view, big-picture approach to water. Ten years after the inaugural Waters of Wisconsin Initiative (2000–2003) we undertook an in-depth look at how conditions have changed in Wisconsin, noting areas of significant progress, challenges that have stayed with us, and emerging issues across water quality, water quantity, and the health of freshwater ecosystems.

In an attempt to address the growing challenges and emerging concerns surrounding water in Wisconsin, our 2016 *Shifting Currents* report recommended nine actions:

- 1. Develop an Integrated Water Management Framework
- 2. Safeguard Drinking Water
- 3. Control Nutrient Pollution
- 4. Apply Watershed-Scale Strategies
- 5. Plan for Climate Change
- 6. Manage Invasive Species
- 7. Modernize Water Infrastructure
- 8. Commit to Transparency and Public Participation
- 9. Invest in Water Literacy

Through our *Shifting Currents* report and Waters of Wisconsin Initiative, the Academy continues to safeguard Wisconsin's fresh water ecosystems and water supply for future generations.





### Climate & Energy Initiative

Through our Climate & Energy Initiative, we hosted our second local government summit on energy and resilience. On April 5 at the Thelma Sadoff Center for the Arts in Fond du Lac, over seventy elected officials, energy experts, utility representatives, and other local decision-makers convened to discuss pressing issues and strategies for building resilient communities. Panels reviewed the changing world of energy decisions, local government innovation, solar energy, financing strategies for renewable energy and energy efficiency, and equity through energy-efficient and affordable housing. A communications workshop provided practical strategies for effectively sharing local stories of success. Participants exchanged business cards, shared resources, and gathered around tables to discuss strategies during the breaks. Leaders returned to their communities equipped with new contacts and ideas for moving Wisconsin forward in energy innovation and addressing climate change impacts.

The Academy is always working to share new and important ideas. To this end, in June 2017 we published an update to the *Climate Forward* report (2014) and hosted a packed and lively public briefing on June 28 at Madison's Central Library. Reviewing topics of conservation and efficiency, renewable energy, transportation, utility leadership, carbon pricing, and research and education, the report notes progress and setbacks since 2014, and also highlights emerging opportunities. Briefing attendees included Academy members, leaders from various groups working in the field, and guests from the legislature. Presenters and participants alike complimented the Academy for its leadership on this topic, and its broad, nonpartisan examination of the challenges at hand.

In an effort to share our science-based recommendations with experts, leaders, and stakeholders across diverse sectors, both the *Shifting Currents and Climate Forward* reports are available for free download at wisconsinacademy.org/reports.

Highlights from 2017 include articles and essays, stories and poems, photographs and paintings from some of the leading thinkers and doers in Wisconsin today:






